




Quick Timeline 1876 - 2020


















Impact of Restrictions

- 1. Chief, Band and Council governance system
- 2. Denied Women status
- 3. Created Reserves
- 4. Encourages voluntary and enforced enfranchisement
- 5. Could expropriate portions of reserves for public works
- 6. Renamed individuals with European names
- 7. Created a permit system to control Indians' ability to sell products from farms
- 8. Prohibited sale of ammunition to Indians
- 9. Prohibited sale of intoxicants to Indians
- 10. Declared potlatch and other cultural ceremonies illegal
- 11. Restricted Indians from leaving their reserve without permission from an Indian agent
- 12. Created residential schools
- 13. Forbade Indian students from speaking their home language
- 14. Forbade western Indians from appearing in any public dance, show, exhibition, stampede, or pageant wearing traditional regalia
- 15. Leased uncultivated reserve lands to non-Indians
- 16. Forbade Indians from forming political organizations
- 17. Prohibited anyone, Indian or non-Indian, from soliciting funds for Indians to hire legal counsel
- 18. Prohibited pool hall owners from allowing Indians entrance
- 19. Forbade Indian students from practicing their traditional religion
- 20. Denied Indians the right to vote
- 21. Is a piece of legislation created under colonial rule for the purpose of subjugating a group of people





The Indian Registrar does not have the power to remove a name from the Indian Register if the individual has been correctly registered, even when the individual wishes to deregister.


The Secure Certificate of Indian Status (SCIS) remains at all times the property of the Government of Canada and must only be used by the person in whose name it is issued. Any take or misleading statement with respect to this application and any supporting document, including the concealment of any material fact, setting or permitting the use of your SCIS by any other individual or agency may lead to criminal prosecution, and is cause for revocation of your SCIS and refusal to issue a SCIS in the future. 


